All Hail to The Pennsylvania Campus, May It Ever Grow More Dear to The Heart of Every Loyal Alumnus.





Ivy Ceremony



T seems but yesterday that the Class of '30 came to Pennsylvania. We were welcomed to her campus in the fall of '26, a short four years ago. We entered our college life with a week's stay at Green Lane where we learned the songs and cheers of Pennsylvania as well as our own war cry of, "Mess 'em up, Get 'em dirty, Pennsylvania! Nineteen-thirty!" Once embarked on the campus we soon became a more compact unit, even though we were spared the torture of the then traditional Field Welcome.

In the first election for temporary officers we elected John H. Ware, 3d, as President, and Donald S. Cooper as Secretary. Under their guidance we were organized for the Flour Fight, and although we lost by a small margin, we showed some of the spirit that was to be displayed on many occasions in the future. Another outstanding event in this first year was the wonderful response to the Christian Association's Memorial Hall drive. The quota of \$12,000 was oversubscribed by more than four thousand dollars.

At the end of our first term we elected our first permanent class officers. Those elected were: President, John H. Ware, 3d; Vice-President, Albert H. Kindler; Secretary, Robert H. Bolton; Treasurer, Donald S. Cooper; Historian, John E. Gilman, Jr.

In the spring we saw our first Rowbottom and several of our members can recall happy, but disastrous results of this conflict. Hey Day was soon upon us. We were happy to be relieved of Regulations, but for a while felt out of place in the new life that opened up as a result of the new attire. Shortly after this we parted for the summer to all parts of the world, sorry to leave, but imbued with the spirit of loyal Pennsylvanians.

In the fall we returned to see the faces of the old friends we had left a short time before. It was with a new feeling that we returned. We were now a part of this great University, and not newcomers.

In the days that came we learned more of our traditions and of the glory of Pennsylvania. In this year, as Sophomores, we instructed the Class of '31 in the rules and regulations becoming those of so little importance in the school. Our feeling toward them was cordial, but the Vigilance Committee, under the leadership of Donald Cooper, meted out discipline with ability and more than mediocre punishment.

Many of the members of the Class turned out for athletic teams, and the coaches soon found in them ability which was later to help lead Pennsylvania to the athletic heights that have been attained in the past few years.

Our Sophomore elections placed the responsibility of the Class upon the able shoulders of John H. Ware, 3d, for the second successive year. He was ably assisted by Edwin F. Koetsch, Vice-President; Harry S. Carhart, Secretary; Philip D. Hartley, Treasurer; and Herman W. Fischer, Historian.

A great realization seemed to dawn upon us as we progressed toward our second summer vacation. We felt that the Class of '30 was destined to be the leader of the campus. We longed for the day when we would be able to have our classmates as leaders of the University in all lines of activities.

At this time many men were elected to the various boards of the publications. The assistant managerships also proved the metal of all those who entered into the competitions for them. As we look back on the managers, we see that our hopes were not unfounded.

Following this summer the dwindling number returned to assume the place of

Upper-Classmen in the affairs of University life.

Class officers engaged the major part of our interest in the fall. After a spirited campaign for all the various offices, we elected the following men to guide us throughout the year and the most delightful Junior Week we could have desired: Duncan S. Briggs, President; Donald S. Cooper, Vice-President; Mervin Drewes, Treasurer; Morton Wilner, Secretary; and Harvey W. Redington, Historian. With Robert Barnes as General Chairman, well-laid plans brought us a splendid Junior Week. On Monday, November the 24th, we had our Cane March with Irvine Auditorium as our objective. There Provost Penniman addressed us and started the Week. The days that followed will long be remembered. The Smoker, the Banquet, and the Prom, added to the wonderful victory over Cornell on Thanksgiving, gave us many events that will always have a place in our minds. Many a fair heart throbbed as we administered this drubbing to the lads from Ithaca.

In the spring we began planning for the election of the men to guide us through

our last and most glorious year at Pennsylvania.

First the Undergraduate Council elections were held and the following men were elected to serve in this capacity: President Robert H. Barnes, Charles L. Campbell, James B. Diven, S. At this time the election of Senior Class President was held, and Robert H. Barnes was unanimously chosen to guide the destiny of the greatest class in Pennsylvania to the time of graduation.

Now our last summer has passed and we are back for our last year at Pennsylvania. In the fall the following were elected to the class offices yet unfilled: William Spates, Vice-President; Joseph Rosenblith, Secretary; William Spencer, Treasurer;

The election of Honor men disclosed four men worthy of the honor, in every sense of the word, which their Class placed upon them. The Honor men are: Morton Wilner, Spoon Man; Robert H. Barnes, Bowl Man; Duncan S. Briggs, Cane Man, and Lemuel Geyer, Spade Man.

For our Class Day we elected Lemuel Geyer, Valedictorian; Adrian Teaf, Class Prophet: Horace E. Crandall, Ivy Orator; John Beddoe, Ivy Ode; and Warren Van

Elmendorf, Class Poet.

Now our four years are passed. Happy days have come and gone, and the achievements of our Class will long be remembered. May our many victories be a foretaste of all the victories of the future, and may the Class of 1930 always honor and revere the name of Pennsylvania.

Penniman Bowl Contests

WITH the changing of time the manifestations of tradition likewise change, and now instead of the Sophomore Class meting out stern, disciplinary measures in the form of class fights, which often resulted in Sophomore reverses, we find organized athletic competitions as the means of fostering class spirit and unity. 
The Penniman Bowl has been competed for annually, and with the passing of each year an increased manifestation of interest has been evident. Each year the class winning the greatest number of events has the honor and distinction of having its numerals inscribed upon the Bowl which is on permanent display in the main lounge in Houston Hall.

The various contests are governed under the Intercollegiate Rules covering the respective sports, and this year the Bowl Committee, in co-operation with Sophomore President Cook and Freshman President Newcomb, has successfully organized the two classes for the athletic contests. As in former years, swimming, water polo, hockey, fencing, baseball, basketball, soccer, boxing, wrestling, track, lacrosse, tennis, crew and rifle are the sports in which the Sophomores and Freshmen will vie with one another to uphold the supremacy of their respective class. 


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ORGANIZATIONS





LASSES in the University's Veterinary School this year have been larger than in any year since 1916. The registration of students has increased in the last three years in all of the veterinary schools in the country.

A recession in the registration began in all Schools in 1916 and there was a gradual decrease in the number of students until three years ago. The increased entrance requirements and the lengthening of the course which became effective in 1916, the disturbed conditions existing during and immediately following the World War, and the depression in the agricultural and livestock industries which followed the deflation of 1921 are some of the factors which are generally held responsible.

At the beginning of this period there was probably a surplus of veterinarians due to the relatively large graduating classes of the preceding decade but after several years of small classes signs of a shortage began to appear. In the last half of the period of low registration,

the total number of graduates each year in all of the schools in the country was less than 150, which was not a sufficient number to replace those lost to the profession from various causes, the United States Bureau of Animal Industry alone requiring 100 new veterinary appointees each year. Leaders among those interested in the livestock and dairy industries became concerned over the situation and articles began appearing in agricultural and dairy journals calling attention to the disadvantages that would arise from an insufficient number of veterinarians. These publications are believed to be largely responsible for the increase in the registration of veterinary students during the last three years.

The demand for veterinary service is increasing. Specialization in the production of foods of animal origin has led to the development of larger herds and flocks, causing the animals to live in closer contact and under more artificial conditions, and requiring more attention to be given to the prevention and treatment of disease. The number of veterinarians engaged in diagnostic and research work in laboratories has greatly increased. As the scientific investigation of animal diseases has progressed, information has been obtained which has extended the field of usefulness of the veterinarian.

The graduates of this year will find a broad field and great opportunities awaiting them and as they go forth the Faculty extends to them best wishes for a successful and happy life.



THE conception of a trained schoolman has changed rapidly in the last few years. The physician intrusted with the care of a child's physical body must have had from six to eight years of college and professional training and he must have served an interneship of at least one year. Until recently, however, the teacher who shapes the child's physical, moral and intellectual education was required to have only a slight mastery of some field of knowledge and some training in the method of presenting his work.

Within the last few years this condition has been changing rapidly. We now realize that the education of a child is dependent upon various factors, many of

which operate outside the school.

Among these factors are the child's own characteristics, including his mental, physiological, and chronological ages, his emotional reactions, his aptitudes, his health and probably other factors that have not been recognized. Another factor is the home with the attitudes of parents, the financial situation, the moral in-


fluence, and the educational atmosphere. These may be favorable or unfavorable, but in any case they influence the work of the teacher one way or the other. The child is also influenced by his contacts on the street, in the park and everywhere he spends any part of his time.

It is not possible for the teacher to be a specialist in classroom instruction and at the same time be an expert in handling the child's mental, physiological, emotional, social, and financial problems. He must, however, have sufficient knowledge of all these

factors to recognize their presence and refer the problem cases to specialists.

This means that every well organized school system must have associated with it experts along these several lines. It is the function of a School of Education to train these experts. The School of Education of the University of Pennsylvania, although it has expanded its work rapidly, is still confining its efforts largely to the training of classroom teachers and school supervisors and administrators. If it is to take its proper place as a leader in the educational field it must, in the near future, extend its work to include the training of every type of specialist needed in a school system.



In 1890 a separate department was formed. In 1920 it became the principal unit in the new School of Fine Arts.

While many factors determine the effectiveness of a university—the most important is the character of its faculty. In a professional school this requirement is particularly controlling.

The Department of Architecture of the University of Pennsylvania enjoys the distinction and advantage of having developed from its formative stages to its present advanced rank under the uninterrupted and eminent leadership of Dean Warren Powers Laird, who for nearly twoscore years had ensured a continuity and symmetry of policy and standards in Architectural education.

In addition to his academic activities, Dr. Laird is preeminent in his chosen field of consulting work, in which he has rendered service to the profession of architecture of very great value. On the occasion of the Third Pan-American Congress of Architects at Buenos Aires, Argen-

tine Republic, Dr. Laird was selected by the United States Government, the University of Pennsylvania, the American Institute of Architects and the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture as a representative. For 35 years he has acted as adviser to public and private bodies upon architectural and related projects in all parts of the United States and Canada. Thus Warren P. Laird was elected Professor of Architecture in 1891 and, by the wish of Mr. Chandler, who then retired as Director, was given full responsibility for the development of the new course. Bringing to this task a preparation formed of office practice, school training and foreign travel, he made a careful study of methods employed in the then foremost schools of Europe and this country and adopted a policy under which the department has since been conducted. This was a recognition of the fact that each of the major subjects of instruction must be taught by a master if the group effect is to be successful. This was not a discovery, for the principle is in universal practice; but the eminent success of the teaching of architecture at Pennsylvania doubtless would have been impossible but for the fact that for a longer period of years than is the case in any other American school a single principle of operation has been consistently followed under a single continuous direction. In N a recent analysis of the records of "notable living men and women of the United States" named in "Who's Who in America," it developed that one of the most conspicuous groups from the standpoint of distinguished achievement is designated "men of science" and embraces several thousand engineers and chemists. Detailed analyses show that these men occupy, acceptably, responsible positions in fields ranging from research in pure science to seats on the New York Stock Exchange.

From this survey we learn that between one and two thousand industrial and commercial organizations, banks and trust companies, as well as twenty-odd colleges and universities are presided over by men educated in applied science and we further find that the ranks of these technically trained men have been drawn upon to supply several state governors, members of Congress, members of the Cabinet and the President of the United States.

With these illuminating facts before us, the wisdom of the University authorities in placing exceptional emphasis upon a broad, cultural, educational background in developing the courses in the Towne Scientific School is clearly apparent.

You, who are soon to close your official undergraduate affiliation with the University of Pennsylvania, are among the first to have benefited by this more liberal opportunity for developing the technical aspects of your work on a foundation of sufficient breadth to warrant the hope that you may not only attain eminence in your chosen fields of specialized activity, but may more readily adapt yourselves to the more general requirements of public opportunity and responsibility because of the inspirational value of the type of course now offered by the Towne Scientific School.

THE Moore School of Electrical Engineering, as a separate school in the University, is now in its seventh year. Prior to 1923 the course in electrical engineering in the University was given in the Department of Electrical Engineering of the Towne Scientific School. In 1923 the Moore School was established through an endowment by the late Alfred Fitler Moore, whose will designated this school as a memorial to his parents.

In 1926 part of the endowment was utilized to purchase and equip a separate building especially adapted to the needs of undergraduate and graduate students in electrical engineering. The laboratories include excellent facilities for research work as well as for the usual undergraduate courses.

Regular undergraduate instruction is given in all branches of electrical engineering, including a thorough groundwork in fundamentals, followed by courses in electrical machinery, industrial ap-


plications, transmission, and electrical communication. There are also ample facilities for graduate study and research in these subjects. An extensive library includes books and technical journals on all electrical and allied sciences. At the present time several graduate students and members of the staff are carrying on important researches, particularly in electrical communication, X-ray and medical applications and in thermionic phenomena. Members of the staff are also cooperating in their research activities with other departments of the University, particularly with the Medical School and the Phipps Institute.

Due to the broad scope of preliminary training received in the freshman and sophomore years in the College, the junior students take up their technical studies with a broader point of view and a thorough preparation for advance work.

In October, 1929, an Evening Graduate Course leading to the degree of Master of Science in Electrical Engineering was inaugurated. Admission to this course requires a technical training equivalent to the undergraduate course in the Moore School of Electrical Engineering.

The Faculty of the Moore School of Electrical Engineering takes this opportunity of expressing to the members of the graduating class its sincere best wishes for a continuation of the success which they have thus far made, and of expressing the hope that as alumni they will continue to show the same cordial spirit of cooperation and loyalty to the University.

It is an indisputable fact that student government has by the very nature of its being, carved for itself a lasting place in the undergraduate life of the colleges and universities throughout the land. It is only right that the members of any large institution, such as the University of Pennsylvania, should shoulder, inasmuch as is possible, the problems and details that surround it.

Realizing this fact the student body in conjunction with the faculty brought into being in 1921, the Undergraduate Council. To this body was given the power of governing and administrating the many activities of the student body. Year by year this student governing body has grown in importance until now it acts in many disciplinary matters, in addition to supervising the various undergraduate affairs.

The composition of the Council has been modified and enlarged from time to time so as to cope with the problems that have become of increasing importance and complexity in the last decade, until it now numbers eighteen men. Six members of the Council represent the six undergraduate schools; three members represent the University as a unit; one man acts as intermediary between the so-called major sports; the five remaining Senior Class members by virtue of the offices they hold, to wit: the president of the Senior Class; the editor-in-chief of the Pennsylvanian; the presidents of the Friars, Hexagon, and Sphinx Senior Societies; and the presidents of the Junior, Sophomore, and Freshman Classes. With this broad membership the Council has earnestly and conscientiously performed its duties.

As Hey Day approaches to sound the end of our college days we pause in retrospection. Many of the problems that the Council faced were far from new. The various class elections, Junior Week, Ivy Week were annual events and were treated with a view to the past traditions and present conditions. A new type of class fight was successfully conducted between the lower classes. Numerous rallies and meetings were marshalled by the Council with the aid of the Senior Societies that contributed in large measure to the college spirit that was shown during the year. Considerable effort was expended in a research among one hundred of the leading colleges and universities throughout the country that should prove of some value in solving the problems that are bound to present themselves in the future. In addition to this administrative work various campus organizations, such as the Debating Club and the Blue Key Society, were subsidized in whole or in part. Such has been the nature of our work.

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
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
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


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
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
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The Kite and Key Chapter of the Blue Key Society



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


The Philomathean Society

The Glee Club

In its second season as an organization entirely separate from the Band and Orchestra, the two musical units with which it was formerly affiliated, the Glee Club has been even more active in campus affairs than in previous years. The club, with a membership of one hundred and fifty men, is the largest in the fifty-five years of the organization's history and has not only maintained its well-established reputation, but has carried forward a carefully-developed musical program.

The Glee Club's first public appearance this season was at the Academy of Music on November 27, 1929, where their usual Thanksgiving Eve concert was enthusiastically received by a large audience. The program was followed by the usual dance in the Academy Foyer, which has become one of the outstanding social functions of Junior week.

Following this concert, the Club journeyed to Atlantic City on November 29, where they rendered a request program at the Ambassador Hotel. The success of the concert was due in a large part to the excellent leadership of William S. Nagle, student conductor, and the solo work of Thomas G. Barlow.

On January 19, 1930, the group again visited Atlantic City. This time as the guests of Haddon Hall, the management of which has made it possible for the Glee Club to count this week-end sojourn at the shore as one of its most pleasant annual activities. Here the work of the University quartette was particularly praiseworthy, and received several encores from an appreciative audience.

The annual Spring production was the result of the efforts of the combined men and women's Glee Clubs of the University. On the evening of April 4, 1930, "The Pirates of Penzance", perhaps the best-loved operetta of a series of favorites turned out by the inimitable Gilbert and Sullivan team, whose efforts in the field of comic opera have never been surpassed, was presented at the Metropolitan Opera House before a capacity audience. The musical scores of the production were directed by Dr. H. Alexander Matthews, while Mr. Edward W. Mumford, graduate manager of the Club, and Mr. Percy W. Edmunds handled the stage technique. Florence Edna Kirk as Mabel, Thomas G. Barlow as the Pirate King, and David Jackson as Frederick, filled the leading roles in outstanding fashion.

The success of the Club this year must be attributed in a large part to the very able directorship of Dr. Matthews who, by his personality and leadership, has sustained the interest of the members and developed a well-rounded group which has proven itself to be fitted for all types of choral work.

For the past season the undergraduate business of the Glee Club has been in the hands of Charles E. Clinton, Jr., Manager; Jerome A. Stinson, President of the Scales Society, and Alden I. Clark and Jerome N. Doumaux, as Assistant Managers.

Among our other publications, a rejuvenated "Junto" has presented an excellent field for undergraduate literary efforts while the "Wharton News" and "Triangle" have served admirably as financial and technical magazines respectively.

Under the able guidance of its members on every board, the Class of 1930 can well be proud of the successful year of Pennsylvania's publications and it is fitting that their most notable achievement should bear testimony of all their accomplishments and be a lasting memorial to their deeds—the "Class Record of Nineteen Hundred and Thirty."

The Franklin Society

THE FRANKLIN SOCIETY is composed of men interested in undergraduate publications. The Editors and Business Managers of each of the five-member publications, "The Record," "The Red and Blue," "The Pennsylvanian," "The Pennsylvania Punch Bowl" and "The Pennsylvania Triangle," automatically become members of the Managing Board of the Franklin Society upon election to office in their respective publications. Dr. George W. McClelland, Vice-Provost in Charge of Undergraduate Schools, is Chairman of the Managing Board. The other members are Edward A. Sibley, Assistant to the Vice-Provost, George A. Brakeley, Vice-Provost in Charge of Administration, and John Solenberger, Graduate Manager of Student Publications.


Every year two men from the Boards of each of the member publications are elected as associate members of the Society in recognition of their achievements in publication work.

Admission to the Society is open to established publications upon approval of the Managing Board.

The original thought of the organization was to develop the Editorial side of the publications, but it was soon found that the financial interests required attention. The Graduate Manager plans budgets and analyzes costs. Financial policies and their effects are studied and the accumulated experience of previous years is made available to the new men when they come into office. The financial obligations of each administration to the Boards of the preceding and ensuing years are carried out through the continuing control exercised by the Graduate Manager, who retains possession of all books and countersigns checks until the affairs of each year are finally settled. He also makes the final distribution of profits, most of which takes place after graduation, and puts into effect the plan of profit-sharing agreed upon at the beginning of the year.

Each publication pays a percentage of its profits into the Publication Fund of the Franklin Society. This fund is in the hands of the Treasurer of the University. It is hoped, when it reaches a sufficient size, that it will be the basis for providing a publications building in which will be one central office for transacting general business in addition to separate quarters for each publication.

For several years the Franklin Society has distributed tickets for the Monday night series of concerts of the Philadelphia Orchestra, having originally sponsored these concerts on the campus when they were given in Weightman Hall. The entire amphitheater of the Academy of Music is now reserved for the University for the Monday night concerts. This makes it possible for students to hear one of the best orchestras at a moderate price without the delay and inconvenience of standing in line for admission. The popularity of these concerts with the student body is attested by the fact that there are two to three times as many applications as there are tickets for distribution.

THE changes which marked the period of transition for "The Pennsylvanian" during 1928-1929 became more firmly established realities during the college year just ended, and a degree of permanence now accompanies their existence. The most important of these innovations, which have now completed a two-year trial, are the creation of a sporting page with comment, and the introduction of the plan of having the Junior Editorial Board competitors attach their initials to their editorials.

Following a long-established custom, "The Pennsylvanian" inaugurated the year 1929-1930 by publishing in September a large Freshman Issue which received a wide circulation among future Pennsylvania men. Among the other noteworthy activities, in which the daily participated during the year may be included the successful campaign against the inadequate traffic management at 37th Street and Woodland Avenue, and the publishing in an issue last March of an account of the reunion of the class of 1915, and its distribution to five hundred members of that group. The usual Cornell Game issue was published on Thanksgiving Day for the annual big game of the football season.

Members of the Class of 1930 on the editorial board, besides capably filling the managerial positions on the staff of the paper, have played active and leading roles in other undergraduate

activities. "Bob" Barnes, president of the Senior Class, "Lem" Geyer, manager of football, "Bill" Day, manager of basketball, and "Monty" Dill, associate manager of basketball are members of the editorial board from this class.

"The Pennsylvanian" is an active member of the "Eastern Intercollegiate Newspaper Association," and is generally recognized as one of the foremost undergraduate dailies in the country.

Herman Fischer, who was elected to the editorial board. In the final year, John Menihan was elected to the Art Board.

While the Bowl has behind it an imposing reputation as three-times winner of the "Judge Cup" for excellence, and the winner of the "College Humor" award for excellence, its position has been strengthened during the tenure of the Class of 1930. In the past year, the Bowl has served as President of the "Eastern College Comics Association," and increased in circulation and size. The managers continued the policy of the Red and Blue with slight changes. The main feature of the year was the "On and Off Woodland Avenue" columns which were full of

vital campus incidents. The famous "Who's Who" continued in existence to bring short sketches of the well-known seniors before the students. Short intimate contacts with popular professors were printed under the title "Faculty Sketches." The Book Review section was ever full of short snappy reviews of current books. And then there were special features and interviews with men, all of which articles were in some manner connected with the campus. To add a little more spice to the editorial material, jokes of sister publications were frequently used. The number of art illustrations was increased.


Even as the "New Yorker" and the "Philadelphia Town Crier" serve their respective interested communities, so the Red and Blue wishes to depict the University Campus and the happenings thereon. It does not attempt to be a source of daily news. The monthly issues are for the purpose of digesting the vital happenings on the campus. This publication is by, for, and of the University students at Pennsylvania. The memory of its past and the glory of its present are enough to give it a treasured place in the hearts of the undergraduates, and also those who have gone on before. Each graduate wishes to look back and review his college days. While in these reveries he sees the Red and Blue, a true Pennsylvania publication, sharing his loyalty to the welfare of his University. Thus the Red and Blue will ever continue to live in service to Pennsylvanians.

The various numbers of the magazine attained distinctive success at their issuance. The "Burlesque Number," a hilarious riot of fun, achieved great acclaim from every reader. It contained parodies on the leading University and national magazines. The Red and Blue did not spare itself in a delightful parody of the "Who's Who" section. "What Every Young Man Should Know Number" appeared at the psychological moment after the advent of spring. It was a great help to spring fever. The "Christmas," "Freshman," "Travel," and "Football" numbers were issued at the right moments of interest in their subjects. All showed a real thoroughness of preparation.

The Class of 1930 may well be proud of its accomplishments in conjunction with the Red and Blue during its four years of association with it.

In 1912, the undergraduate students in the Towne Scientific School conceived the idea of publishing a quarterly engineering magazine. This resulted in the immediate appearance of a Towne Scientific School Journal. In 1923, the Journal was admitted into the "Engineering College Magazines Associated," representing an organization of twenty-odd publications in numerous colleges and universities scattered throughout the United States. Then in 1925, the Journal became a monthly publication bearing a new name, the Pennsylvania Triangle. Since this time a subdivision of the schools has


made the magazine a representative publication of the Towne Scientific School, the School of Fine Arts, and the Moore School of Electrical Engineering. A fast-growing interest in the Triangle, on the part of the students in these various schools, has caused a steady improvement of the magazine during each succeeding year of publication. At the annual E. C. M. A. Convention, held last fall in Lafayette, Indiana, the Triangle was awarded first places for the Best Covers, the Best Student Articles, and the Best Illustrations during the year 1928-29.

As a result of these awards the Triangle became automatically the leading college engineering magazine for that year.

The outstanding feature of the current year was the March issue, the largest issue ever printed. New sections, new section heads, and a general trend towards modernistic make-up have been entered in the Triangle due to the policy of improving the magazine, adopted by the Managing Board at the time of their inauguration in May, 1929. This Board graduates, satisfied with its accomplishments and predicting a prosperous future for the Pennsylvania Triangle.




During the current year there has been an unusual degree of cooperation among the working units of JUNTO, and from the members of the University

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

Council on Athletics

THERE was an exceptional turnout of candidates for all teams during the past academic year. Whether this reawakening of spirit was caused by the abolishment of the old distinction between major and minor sports, or the average student is taking a greater interest in athletics, is left to conjecture.

Sufficient it is to report that the coaches of almost every sport felt satisfied with the number of candidates. As to the calibre of the candidates the coaches refused to plead. Rowing suffered somewhat by the students forgetting that the sport is one of the best body builders on the athletic curriculum.

"Rusty" Callow could have used at least fifty more than he had during the middle of April when he was laying his plans for the extensive schedule the oarsmen faced during the season.

One need only point to lacrosse as an indication of the desire of most students to indulge in some recreation. More than one hundred candidates, the largest in the history of the sport, turned out for lacrosse. And as results speak for themselves it only need be mentioned that the team scored a surprising victory over a combined Oxford-Cambridge team.

With the increased numbers of candidates for the teams more space is necessary. Where the expansion can be made is problematic. Hampered as she is by being virtually in the center of a great city, Pennsylvania cannot breathe too fully without breaking through its confines. However, some day when one of the graduating class of 1930 is reading over the Class Record and has a plethora of cash he can donate to his university a piece of land where every student can participate in his chosen sport.

One change of major importance was made in athletics during 1929-1930 and that concerned football. Louis A. Young, after seven years of success as head coach, at the conclusion of the 1929 season, decided to leave the coaching field. He was succeeded by J. R. Ludlow Wray, famed as a center during his undergraduate days and more recently as line coach of the varsity team.

Young after his resignation was appointed assistant to the chairman of the Council on Athletics, giving his attention to keeping close contact with the institutions Pennsylvania meets in all sports and acting as representative of the chairman at important intercollegiate meetings.

Wray shortly after his appointment selected his coaching staff, which included Carl Thomas, line coach, Albert Kreuz, backfield coach, Simon Paux-

tis, end coach, and Lon Jourdet, assistant end coach. Pauxtis, a graduate of the class of 1909, is the only newcomer on the list.

The coaching staff received its baptism of fire during spring practice and accredited itself nobly. Judging by its early results Pennsylvania is fortunate in having secured such able teachers of the great college sport.

Since the fall of 1929 Pennsylvania has accomplished considerable success in athletics. The football team concluded its campaign by winning seven of its nine games, losing to California on Franklin Field in the first visit of a Pacific Coast team in history, and to Penn State. The margin of one touchdown sent the Golden Bears back to Berkeley happy, while State by virtue of two intercepted forward passes achieved its purpose.

Franklin and Marshall, Virginia Polytechnic, Lehigh, Swarthmore, Navy, Columbia and Cornell were the victims of Captain Utz and his teammates.

The track team not only won the cross-country championship but tried for first place in the indoor intercollegiates. Bernard Berlinger, one of the greatest of all-around stars Pennsylvania has ever had, scored eight of the twenty-seven and one-half points in the indoor championships. Later Berlinger for the second year in succession won the septathlon championship at the University of Illinois indoor games. In the same meet the four-mile relay team established a new record for the event.

The basketball team after two consecutive championships was forced to accept second place in the Intercollegiate league. Three defeats, two by Columbia, the champions, and one by Cornell prevented a third title. During the season twenty of the twenty-six games were won.

During the year the Coaches' Association held two meetings to which the leaders in undergraduate activities were invited to discuss the student side of athletics. Much good was accomplished as a result of the meetings, including better accommodations for undergraduates at football games.

HE 1929 football season had much to offer to its followers. It was a most unusual year, holding glorious victories and unexpected bitter defeats. Triumphs and disasters were met, but one fact stood paramount in the team's record. And that was the close bond, cooperation, and team play of all the men. No one or two players stood apart or distinct from the rest, but rather they were all a unit and as such played throughout the entire 1929 season.

But let us start at the beginning. On September 28th, Pennsylvania opened the season by defeating Franklin and Marshall 14 to 6 before a crowd of 40,000, a record for the opening game of the season. Carlsten's dash of 97 yards for a touchdown in the beginning of the game after the kickoff was the outstanding feature. The Franklin and Marshall team was exceptional, and scored a touchdown in the first quarter of the game, their first against Pennsylvania since 1915. Although they failed to add to this tally, yet every yard was fiercely contested, Gette's touchdown in the final period bringing the victory to Penn.

The next week, October 5th, Swarthmore invaded Franklin Field and were downed by the Red and Blue by a score of 20 to 6. Masters and Riblett did the entire scoring for Penn. Swarthmore put up a gallant fight and though the playing was a bit ragged on both sides,

Pennsylvania's superior force and speed won the day.


Then came an invasion from the South, for the first game in history, between Pennsylvania and Virginia Polytechnic Institute. To Walt Masters went the individual glory of beating the Southerners in their first visit to Philadelphia. Penn after staging a third period comeback downed Virginia 14 to 8.

On October 18th, a powerful Pacific Coast eleven came to Franklin Field. The weather was warm and sunny, and 70,000 saw California play its first game in the East. The claws of the Golden Bear were too long and strong for the sons of Pennsylvania and the final period ended with California leading 12 to 7. The game started badly for Pennsylvania, Benny Lom, California's sensational star, made 65 yards on the kickoff through a swarm of Penn tacklers. The Red and Blue seemed to be faced by a disastrous defeat, but the tide soon changed. Pennsylvania secured the ball and Gentle immediately made forty yards back. Masters made a touchdown for the Red and Blue after a blocked punt by Utz. From then on the game was a bitterly contested struggle. California scored twice, failing to kick the extra points, while Pennsylvania several times loomed close to another goal, but the final whistle found them on the short side of the score.

The following Saturday, Lehigh met with its first defeat of the season at the hands of Pennsylvania. Coach Young started the game with the reserves, but Lehigh displayed unusual strength and the first team was forced into the fray. It was not an easy conquest and the Red and Blue fought for every yard. Magai scored Pennsylvania's touchdown in the second quarter while Davidowitz tallied for Lehigh tying the score. In the fourth quarter, Masters kicked a field goal from a most difficult angle, making the final score 10 to 7 for Pennsylvania.

The next week, a record crowd of 75,000 saw Navy humbled by a score of 7 to 2. It was our game throughout and Navy was kept to a single two points. Wilner made a forty-yard run for a touchdown after a pass from Masters. Pennsylvania played inspired ball and held Navy the entire game. As is the custom, eight corps of midshipmen paraded on the field prior to the game. It was an impressive spectacle and

the Navy game was played as one of the bright lights of the football season.

On November 9th, our team met its second defeat of the season against Penn State 19 to 7, after clearly outplaying them during the first period. Gette, Masters, and Carlsten were injured during the play which was extremely rough. Graupner scored Pennsylvania's sole touchdown in the second quarter.

Pennsylvania, with a large injured list, succeeded in downing Columbia 20 to 0 the following Saturday. Charlie Greene starred on the defense while Gentle created the offense, making gains of 54, 26, and 21 yards. Gentle, Ratowsky and Wilner all succeeded in carrying the ball across Columbia's goal line while Gentle made two placements for the extra points.

The Thanksgiving Day classic with Cornell gave "Gloomy" Gil Dobie something to be really gloomy about. 70,000 saw the thrilling game in which Cornell led 7 to 0 at the end of the first half. However, Gentle caught the ball on the kickoff of the second half, fumbled back of the goal, recovered, and then ran the entire length of the field for a touchdown. It was the most sensational play ever seen on Franklin Field for many years. Several times Gentle seemed about to be downed, yet each time he struggled free and finally finished under the Cornell goal posts, one hundred and three yards from where he caught the ball. From that point on the team could not be stopped. Masters' run of fifty-two yards paved the way for Gentle's second touchdown. To make the score doubly secure, Masters scored three additional points by a beautiful field goal, and the game ended with Pennsylvania on the top side of a 17 to 7 score. Whenever the victories of the 1929 season are recounted, that over Cornell will always stand foremost in the telling.

In closing, the Class of 1930 wishes to express its appreciation for his interest and services.



When the first call for the initial practice of the season was issued by Head Coach Douglas Stewart in September, only six veterans of the 1928 squad were among the aspirants for berths on the 1929 Soccer Team, these being Captain Hruslinski, H. Redington, F. D. Graham, P. Ragan, C. Woolever, and W. Brownback. However, there was a wealth of material from the reserve squad and the Freshman squad, and under Coach Stewart's keen guidance and supervision, this group of varsity soccer team potentialities were developed into the 1929 Varsity, which throughout the season proved to be one of the most successful and brilliant teams Pennsylvania has turned out during the course of the past six years. After several weeks of intensive practice, the Red and Blue booters opened the 1929 Soccer Season with their match against Swarthmore College, on Saturday, Octo-

ber the 12th. This was the initial intercollegiate tilt of the year, consequently it was decidedly to Pennsylvania's interest to open the season with a victory. Swarthmore had a decided advantage in that it had retained its entire undefeated team of the year previous, but with that indomitable spirit, which is so characteristic of Pennsylvania teams, the Red and Blue booters displayed unequaled skill and proved too strong for their formidable opponents, thus emerging victorious by the score of two to one.

The second match of the season was to be played with Yale, the intercollegiate champions of the preceding year, so on the following Saturday the entire squad made the journey to New Haven to attempt to dethrone the "champs." Captain Hruslinski and his teammates put up a strenuous struggle, and when the whistle blew for the close of the

second half, the score was three to three, neither team seemingly able to gain any decisive advantage over the other. An extra period resulted, but still the score remained as at the close of the second period, three to three.

Continuing their brilliant footwork and consistent drive, the following Saturday the Pennsylvania team tallied a decisive nine to three victory over the Lehigh booters. Haverford College was the Varsity's next opponent, and in this match Pennsylvania was again in her prime. Hence Haverford, unable to withstand the intensive attacks of the Red and Blue booters, went down to a five to four defeat. The score was actually not indicative of the fine playing which Pennsylvania displayed, due to the occurrence of several unfortunate incidents which prevented its being more decisive. L. Bollers, playing left half-back for the Red and Blue, fouled Haverford's outside right in the penalty area,

and Haverford tallied on the free kick. Soon after, P. Ragan accidentally headed the ball into Pennsylvania's goal. Then, in the second half due to the muddy turf which had resulted from the heavy shower which had fallen, F. Logan, the right half-back, in attempting to save a shot, faltered, and as a result the ball was accidentally scuffled into Pennsylvania's own net, thereby giving the Haverford eleven a total of three goals.

The following Saturday, Pennsylvania's confidence was shaken when the team met defeat by the score of three to one, at the hands of the Penn State booters. The lone Red and Blue goal was the result of Captain Hrus-

linski's exceptional display of capable footwork. The defeat, however, seemingly had no lasting ill effects, for on the following Monday, Pennsylvania came back with a renewed spirit to send the Harvard booters back to Cambridge on the small end of a four to nothing score. Harvard displayed a fine defense, but its attack was broken up by the Red and Blue's invincible full backs, P. Ragan and C. Woolever.

The two remaining games resulted in victories for Pennsylvania. On November the 23rd, the team journeyed to Princeton and administered a decisive defeat, to the tune of five to two, to the Black and Orange eleven. Thanksgiving brought the close of the season with a victory over Cornell. Throughout the entire season the team displayed consistent and coherent team-work, and with the flashes of brilliancy on the part of the various individual players,

Which the opening of the 1929-1930 basketball season, Pennsylvania, with four veterans back and excellent material from last year's undefeated Freshman team, had a strong nucleus around which to build a team that would defend its Eastern Intercollegiate League title for the third straight season. Though during the league season seven games were won and three lost, the Red and Blue tossers were forced to accept second place to the fast-moving, skillful Columbia five, which registered two victories over Captain "Ed" Lobley and his teammates, the other reverse being dealt by Cornell.

In spite of the loss of the Eastern Intercollegiate crown, Pennsylvania completed a very successful season with twenty victories out of twenty-six starts. The season was opened

with impressive wins over St. Josephs and Gettysburg quintets. Then followed, during the Christmas holidays, an invasion of the Palestra by teams from the West and the South. Michigan, last year's Western Conference champs, in a very fast and thrilling battle, managed to eke out in the closing minutes of the game, a victory. However, Indiana, Georgia Tech and Ohio State were turned back in succession by the sparkling Red and Blue five. Following these victories, Pennsylvania proceeded to run up a winning streak of eight straight games with victories over Dickinson, Yale, Haverford, Dartmouth, and Navy. However, a stop was put, when a great Syracuse team came to the Palestra for the first time, and before a large crowd overcame the Red and Blue tossers in the last few minutes of play, when a long field goal fol-

lowed by a free throw from the foul-line clinched the game. Pennsylvania undaunted by this reverse, proceeded to vanquish Penn State in the next game and the following week, Cornell was conquered in a thrilling extra period game. The next engagement was at Columbia, where before a capacity-packed hall, Captain "Ed" Lobley and his teammates suffered their first Eastern Intercollegiate League defeat. Following this setback, Pennsylvania not at all discouraged, journeyed to Cambridge where a crushing defeat was administered to Harvard, and the next week Princeton, too, was forced to accept the short end of the score.

At this period of the season, the Red and Blue's championship hopes received a crushing blow when Freddy Ullrich, star sophomore forward and League leading scorer, was declared ineligible together with Maurice McKniff, another

brilliant sophomore performer who alternated at guard and at the forward positions. Another loss was suffered when Gerald Prager, a valuable utility man, left school. To fill these vacancies, Coach McNichol moved up Tom Barlow and Paul Riblett from the Junior Varsity ranks.

Cornell, defeated earlier in the season, invaded the Palestra and in a thrilling last minute rally came out ahead. This forced Pennsylvania from a tie with Columbia for first place in the League standing, to accept for the first time in three years second place standing. Then the Red and Blue five thoroughly aroused began to fight hard for its League Crown. After defeating Swarthmore and Dartmouth here, a journey was made to Yale where the league-leading Columbia five had already suffered a reverse. However, Pennsylvania's spirit and determination for victory was too strong to be stopped, and the scrapping Bulldogs were overcome. In the next engagement, Notre Dame forced the Red and Blue for the third time in as many years, to accept the small end of the score.

As Pennsylvania had only lost two games and Columbia one, it was possible for the University team to force a tie and a play-off game for the League championship by defeating the Blue and White quintet. But the Columbia five bent on winning her first League crown was not to be denied, and in a game marked by close-guarding on the part of both teams, the New Yorkers overcame Pennsylvania's stubborn resistance by the score of 29-23.

The curtain on the 1929-1930 season was rung down when the Red and Blue passers out-scored Princeton in the last game of the schedule. This game marked the end of the college careers for Captain Edward Lobley, a

veteran of three years service, who alternated at forward and at guard; Thomas Magner one of the best guards in Pennsylvania basketball history; and Thomas Barlow, a junior varsity performer for two and a half seasons.

In spite of the loss of these valuable men, Pennsylvania will have for the next court season the services of four brilliant sophomore performers. This includes Leonard Tanseer, a star guard who led his team in scoring; Freddy Ullrich and Maurice McKniff, luminaries whose services were lost in mid-season; and Harold Sanders who finished the season at forward position. These men together with Captain-elect "Al" Broadbeck, the veteran mainstay at forward position during the entire season and James Peterson, the hard fighting veteran center, will form a nucleus for a championship five. Other letter men who will return to give the regulars a battle are Al Ushka, Paul Riblett, and Howard Hale.

Prospects from the Freshman squad are very promising with such performers as Hendler, Clary, Mack, Kelly, Levy, and Block, which men are sure to make a strong bid for regular berths.



THE collegiate track world, in the spring of 1929, saw Pennsylvania represented on the cinder path by one of the best teams in the East. The national and international track world witnessed an indoor track team from the University of Pennsylvania complete a brilliant and winning winter season. The Red and Blue runners are looking forward to the clash with the West coast teams this May with high hopes of settling the intercollegiate track crown back on Eastern shores.

The first competition for the runners and field men came when the spring season of 1929 opened with the Annual Handicaps. The next week-end Franklin Field was the scene of a brilliant struggle between stars of high school, preparatory school, and college—The Thirty-Fifth Annual Relay Carnival on April 26-27. The decathlon, the feature event of the Friday competition was won by Barney Berlinger, who, in winning 7298.97 points, defeated some

great trackmen, such as Churchill of Oklahoma, and Todd of Indiana. Pennsylvania men figured prominently in the Carnival. The distance medley team, made up of Saxon, Pearson, Ritchie, and Montgomery, won its event against strong teams from Harvard and New York University. George McCoy, then starting a fine season on the track, was second to Flippin of Virginia in the special high hurdle race. The quarter mile relay team finished second to Ohio State in this fast sprint relay. McNiff ran third in a special mile race, competing against Lermond, and Martin, two of the country's best milers. Paul Lee took fourth place in the javelin. In the one mile college relay championships, Pennsylvania placed fourth.

In a record breaking meet on May 4th, Pennsylvania, visiting Yale at New Haven, trimmed the Eli tracksters by the score of $73\frac{2}{3}$ to $61\frac{1}{3}$. McCoy, Lamberg, Merembeck, Newkirk and Ber-

linger, Red and Blue men, were first place winners whose efforts in each event smashed the existing meet record. On Franklin Field, May 11, Pennsylvania men crashed through with a decisive win over Cornell. The score was $81\frac{1}{3}$ points to $53\frac{2}{3}$ points. Existent meet records on that day were not safe. Two were broken and two equalled. Barney Berlinger in the high jump and Lamoine Boyle, finding himself in the broad jump, were the record breaking performers. McCoy and Harris Sachs in the hundred, turned in fast performances to equal the meet record in their events. A close meet was lost to Dartmouth at Hanover, May 25th. The score indicates the tightness of competition. Dartmouth's 68½ points was only two points better than Pennsylvania's. Kastler won both the dashes, while Barney Berlinger kept up his brilliant work by getting a first in the shot putt, a tie for first in the high jump, third in the javelin and second in the pole vault. Pennsylvania showed a great balanced team in every one of these dual meets and the Red and Blue's success was due to this fact.

On the last day of May, Berlinger, Harris Sachs, Steiner, Newkirk, Boyle, Saxer, Bill Kastler, and George McCoy qualified for Saturday's events. The west coast teams dominated the Intercollegiates in the field and in the dashes but two Pennsylvania men pushed two of these Western representatives to new records. Stanford, far ahead with more than 45 points, won the title. Southern California made 21 points to gain second place over Pennsylvania with 187/8. The Red and Blue's points were made by Berlinger, who taking third in the shot-put, pushed Rothert of Stanford to a new I. C. A. A. A. A. record; Barney also tied for second place in the high jump; Newkirk tied for fourth place in the high jump; Lamoine Boyle was just beaten for first place in the broad jump by another Californian record breaker; Montgomery was fifth in the two-mile run; Kastler took fourth in a fast two-twenty dash; Norman Saxer was fourth in the quarter mile; McCoy ran third to Nichols of Stanford and Bud Collier of Brown in the high hurdles.

The freshman team won two of its three dual meets: those with Hill School and Cornell Freshmen. At Princeton the team was defeated by the Tiger freshmen. Steele, Kerr, McNiff, Coan, Smith and Aldred were all consistent scorers during the season for the yearlings.

Throughout the indoor season of 1929-1930 Pennsylvania was represented by consistent winners on the boards in New York City and Philadelphia. Coach Robertson, after watching his men take first honors with Cornell at the Indoor Intercollegiates, accompanied them to Champaign, Illinois, to the Illinois Re-


lays, where Middle Western track men were shown some fine Eastern performances.

McNiff, Charles Pfeiffer, a freshman star, Barney Berlinger, and several relay men, Captain Bill Kastler, Kerr, Steele, McLoughlin, Coan, and Montgomery, and Roland Ritchie, were all high place winners during the winter campaign. They competed at the Millrose Games, the New York A. C. games in New York and at the Meadowbrook Club games.

Pennsylvania trackmen tied with Cornell for the indoor college track title at New York, March first. McNiff and Barney Berlinger were crowned as champions that night. The former defeating Joe Hickey of New York University and Barney tying with a Harvard man in the pole vault. Montgomery and Coan picked up extra points by placing in the mile; Boyle jumping in great form took second place in the broad jump; Big Fred Steiner threw the thirty-five pound weight and gained fourth prize; Ritchie, the mile relay team, and the freshman medley team, were point winners.

Pennsylvania closed the indoor season with a startling show of power at the Illinois Relays at Champaign, Illinois. The feature event of the meet was the septathlon. One of the competitors won the hurdles, the vault, the shotput, and the high jump; he also was second in the broad jump, third in the dash and seventh in the half-mile. He won for the second consecutive year the Illinois septathlon. This man was Barney Berlinger. The four-mile relay team composed of Ritchie, Montgomery, Coan, and McNiff, established a new meet record for this distance event. A more formidable quartet of milers are not to be found in collegiate ranks today. Lamoine Boyle took a second place in the broad jump.

This auspicious performance was the closing of the 1929-1930 winter track season for Pennsylvania runners and field men. They open their spring campaign at the Relays and a more brighter outlook could not be realized. After these games and a trio of dual meets the Red and Blue athletes will enter the I. C. A. A. A. agames and with the ability and spirit they have shown all year, with the steady and wise guiding hand of Lawson Robertson back of them, these Pennsylvania trackmen will not be content until they have established the East supreme in track and field.



ROSS country at Pennsylvania has had a most successful season. Coach Lawson Robertson, drawing upon last year's undefeated Freshmen team, produced a combination that is considered one of the strongest in the country and among the best at Pennsylvania for several years.

On November 9th, at Van Cortlandt Park in New York City, the annual Quadrangular meet was held. Led by Dan Dean, Pennsylvania's Cross Country team defeated Columbia, Cornell, and Dartmouth. Pennsylvania totaled twenty-one points against fifty-one for Cornell. Columbia was third with fifty-seven and Dartmouth last with eighty-one. Pennsylvania had five men in the first seven places completely outclassing the field. Dean went over the six mile course in 30.55 seconds which is considered remarkably good time. Bill McNiff of Pennsylvania was second, coming in fifteen seconds behind

Dean. Joe Hagen of Columbia placed third, Captain Levering of Cornell fourth, followed by Montgomery, Ritchie, and Coan, all of Pennsylvania to clinch Penn's five places.

A short time later, the Twenty-First Annual Intercollegiate Cross-Country Run was held, also in Van Cortlandt Park. One hundred and thirty-five men started representing twenty-one institutions. Against such strong competition, Pennsylvania placed five men in the first twenty-seven and captured team honors with a point score of sixty-two. Michigan State was second with eighty-one and Bates College third with ninety-eight points. Bill McNiff was the first of the Red and Blue harriers to score, placing sixth and followed a second later by Carl Coan. Montgomery placed tenth followed by Dan Dean in the twelfth position. Ritchie came in twenty-seventh, giving Pennsylvania its total of sixty-two points and the team championship of the Intercollegiate Run.

It may easily be claimed that the present combination is rated as one of the fastest and most consistent scoring teams in the country. Pennsylvania is indeed proud of this year's cross-country team.

When the first call for the Freshmen Crew was issued in the fall of 1926, the Class of 1930 lost no time in answering it by turning out in large numbers. The usual fall practice was held, and within a few days of the opening of practice, several crews were rowing in barges. At that time very few of the "huskies" had ever pulled an oar, but they were all willing and anxious to learn, and within the space of a few weeks the majority of the men were on the road to being well versed in the fundamentals of good oarsmanship.

After the conclusion of the Annual Fall Regatta the various aspirants were granted a rest, but after the New Year, rowing was resumed on the machines. It was during this period that the fight for a position upon the Freshmen Crew began in earnest, and after a strenuous training the following men were chosen to represent Pennsylvania in the Freshmen race at Poughkeepsie: Bow, J. Menihan; No. 2, J. Weis; No. 3, A. Teaf; No. 4, C. Krampf; No. 5, J. VanQuereau; No. 6, R. Sears; No. 7, W. Pine; Stroke, K. Edwards; Coxswain, W. Trowbridge. The crew made an impressive showing in the race at Poughkeepsie, having given both California and Wisconsin its wash.


During their second year, the crew men of the Class of 1930 were not to be found idling when the fall practice started. Instead our

classmates turned out with a renewed vim and vigor to strive to uphold the honor of Pennsylvania upon the water. That year in the Pough-keepsie Regatta four of the men who rowed were members of the Class of 1930; these being Teaf, Pine, Krampf, and Taeffner. The Junior Varsity Crew was also composed of several of our classmates, including Sears and Edwards. This year a new mentor, in the person of Russell C. Callow, known to the crew world as "Rusty," was secured to coach Pennsylvania's crews, and under his able leadership the various crews worked hard to maintain Pennsylvania's rightful place on the water.

The 1929 season was likewise a year during which the Class of 1930 showed its true colors on the water. At Poughkeepsie, Taeffner, Teaf, Captain Krampf, Pine, Weis, and Trowbridge represented us on the Varsity Crew. In this Regatta Pennsylvania's crew took third place, finishing the four-mile course in slightly over twenty-three minutes and forty-one seconds, just forty-three seconds behind Columbia, the winner. This year also brought with it a new Assistant Coach, James Matthews, who succeeded Fred Spuhn, upon the latter's resignation to coach the Yale Freshmen. Under the tutorship of Coach Matthews, the lightweights, composed of Missimer, Delamater, Larrabee, Kneen, Cornog, Ranck, Davis, Russell, and Anderson, showed a lot of spirit, and in the Navy race took first place with the time of seven minutes and forty-four seconds.



In the triangular regatta with Navy and Harvard, held at Annapolis on May the eighteenth, Pennsylvania showed the other two crews her wash. It was in this race that the Pennsylvania crew rowed its best. In the American Henley Regatta there was no Varsity race, but Pennsylvania's Freshmen Crew showed its true colors in finishing a very close second to Princeton Freshmen. The Freshmen seating for this race, as at Poughkeepsie, was as follows: Bow, Butler; No. 2, Cadwalader; No. 3, Meehan; No. 4, Martin; No. 5, Johnson; No. 6, Weeks; No. 7, Cook; Stroke, Hupfel; Coxswain, Loveless.

This year the prospects for a successful season are very bright, with six members left from last year's Varsity Crew. A prediction of any nature is very difficult to make,



ENCING is one of the oldest and most distinguished sports at the University of Pennsylvania. Established as an intercollegiate sport at the University almost thirty years ago, fencing at Pennsylvania has produced numerous intercollegiate and national champions, and in addition has developed a system of fencing which, in its physical and psychological applications, has won world-wide recognition.

This year's fencing team has been one of the most successful in recent seasons. Completing an extremely difficult season against a large number of veteran teams, the Pennsylvania foil team qualified for the finals of the Intercollegiate Championships by defeating Columbia, Ohio State, and Princeton while losing only to the powerful Navy foilsmen whose superior physique and experience were too much for the University trio. One of the most interesting matches of the year was the one with Harvard. Though losing the match by the close score of 9—8, the Red and Blue fencers displayed great form and able technique.

Captain Lawson, Feo, and Solomon comprised the foil team and shared equally in honors against their opponents. Neff and Tarlau, who represented the University in

epee, also were successful during the season, winning a majority of their dual meets and failing to qualify for the Intercollegiates only because of the illness of Neff. Tarlau in addition placed third in the Pennsylvania State Epee Championships, and thus qualified for the semi-final round of the National Championships.

In saber Rodriquez, a member of the Class of 1930, was the University's stellar performer, and was ably assisted by Galloway. Rodriquez is the only member of the team to be lost by graduation with the Class of 1930, though several members of the team may be lost for next year's competition due to their graduation in February.

In addition to the varsity competition an innovation was made this season in the way of a junior varsity fencing team which lost to the University of Delaware by the score of eleven to six, and won from the Philadelphia Turngemeinde by the same score. William W. Pryce, Wharton '30, was a member of the junior varsity team in epee.

The freshman team also divided honors with their opponents, losing to the Navy plebes in their first meet, and decisively defeating the Hun School team in their second contest.


The season of 1929 was one of the most successful in years, the team coming through with fourteen wins out of a total of seventeen matches played. In the pre-



AST year was Coach Middleton's first at Pennsylvania but in spite of the difficulties of developing a new system his success was outstanding. The team made a fine showing, ending the season with a record of six victories as against four defeats.

The squad is fortunate this year in having lost only one man by graduation. Wes Stanger, last year's captain, was


the senior who was graduated.



Rutgers, handicapped by the lack of good practice conditions because of the burning of their gymnasium, was easily defeated. In this game Captain Jack Merriam scored thirty-one points,

more than enough to win without the additional goals of Dolgin and Fretz. Meeting C. C. N. Y. in New York, Coach Merriam's Team won thirty to ten. The New York boys scored one touch goal and five fouls, Pennsylvania's goal being threatened only twice during the entire game. Coach Allen brought a strong Syracuse team to the Hutchinson Gym on March 8th but the Red and Blue, playing brilliant polo, added another victory to make a string of three. On the following Wednesday, the Columbia team led by Ray Ruddy defeated the varsity thirty-three to twenty-eight. A victory in this game would have placed Pennsylvania in a triple tie for second place in the league, but the strategy of the Kennedy coached team, which defeated Yale, again proved its superiority and Columbia won by the scant margin of a single touch goal. At Dartmouth, where Pennsylvania closed the season with a victory, Jack Merriam collected forty-two points to win the individual scoring title of the League with a total of one hundred seventy-nine points.

Ed Kassel, the varsity goal, is the only regular to graduate. Jack Merriam, who was reelected captain for 1931, and seven other letter men will return next year. In addition to this, there is a wealth of material coming from the Freshman team. Combining strength, speed, and ability, the yearlings defeated the Navy Plebes for the first setback the Middies have met in five years. From this large squad of experienced men Coach "Bill" Merriam expects to pick a team that will place Pennsylvania high in the League standing.
