Call to Order

Chair Ramanan Raghavendran welcomed attendees and thanked Trustees for participating in the productive meetings of the previous day. He noted that Board members enjoyed tours, dinner, and a panel discussion with faculty and students about the climate crisis at the new Vagelos Laboratory for Energy Science and Technology.

Vice President for Social Equity and Community and University Chaplain Reverend Charles Howard delivered the invocation.

The minutes of the meetings of the Trustees on November 14, 2024, and the Executive Committee on December 12, 2024, were approved as distributed.

Chair's Remarks - Ramanan Raghavendran

Chair Raghavendran presented a Resolution of Appreciation for Richard C. Perry, noting his new designation as Trustee Emeritus and commending his service as a Trustee which began in 2005. He thanked Trustee Perry for his extraordinary commitment to realizing the vision of the Penn Compact, as well as his transformational philanthropy, which has strengthened the University, its faculty, and its global reach.

Trustee Perry expressed his gratitude, sharing memories of his experience at Penn and the opportunities that the University afforded him over the years, highlighting his ability to support the education of students, the creation of Penn Integrates Knowledge professorships, and the establishment of Perry World House.

Chair Raghavendran presented a Resolution authorizing the approval of the voluntary dissolution and strike-off of Penn Medicine London.

President's Report – J. Larry Jameson

Interim President J. Larry Jameson began by stating that universities like Penn have never been more critical to individual success, societal progress, and human thriving, noting the caliber of Penn's work, the excellence of its people and priorities, and its orientation toward the common good have never been stronger. Dr. Jameson noted that Penn and American higher education now face challenges that have not been seen in our lifetimes—both fiscal and philosophical—challenges that significantly affect Penn's groundbreaking research and teaching, its resources for opportunity and community, and its clinical care and service.

He stated there is no need to recite the changing landscape of recent executive orders, federal guidance, and pending legal actions, as everyone is closely watching these developments. While Penn has always upheld the law and will continue doing so, it must be cleareyed about the future, which may be altered dramatically depending on how these developments unfold. He stated his wish to amplify a message he had shared with the University community earlier this week.

Dr. Jameson stated he understood how anxious many people feel right now, with feelings that can be deep, and very personal. He noted however that the Penn community should know that the value, rightness, and impact of the University's contributions and promise have not changed. He stated that what has changed is the growing polarization of public opinion about higher education and resulting changes in federal oversight.

Dr. Jameson stated he has heard from many that Penn must respond and adapt to the rapidly shifting landscape but do so while preserving Penn's soul. He noted that he passionately agrees: Penn must ground everything it does in its missions, and uphold freedom of inquiry and thought, open expression, and rigorous pursuit of excellence and truth.

Dr. Jameson stated that Penn must stand firm in its commitment to principled non-discrimination, continuing to expand access and to embrace diversity in the broadest possible sense, including providing opportunity and support to those who face socioeconomic and other hurdles. He noted this vision, and these values, have made Penn a pioneer in higher education for a long time, and the University is stronger for it. He remarked that commitment to inclusive excellence has advanced research, scholarship, and patient care in profound ways, and Penn will continue welcoming and supporting the most talented and most promising students, faculty, and staff.

He stated there is no denying that today's challenges will test Penn, but it should be remembered that the University of Pennsylvania has been fulfilling its missions for 285 years, and has weathered wars, pandemics, great depressions, and recessions.

Dr. Jameson stated Penn will pursue its future with idealism and pragmatism, courage and agility. In conclusion, he emphasized that these essential Penn characteristics have served it well, and Penn's enduring principles will see it through.

Dr. Jameson presented a Resolution to Appoint Jonathan A. Epstein as Executive Vice President of the University of Pennsylvania for the Health System and Dean of the Perelman School of Medicine, citing his nearly three decades of service as a key leader at Penn and his contributions as a globally recognized scientist to the understanding of the molecular mechanisms of human biology and disease, with profound implications for treating pediatric and adult cardiovascular disease.

Dr. Jameson presented a Resolution to Appoint Matthew Grossman as Vice President of University Communication, citing his wealth of communications experience, global perspective, and admirable record of creative, strategic, and collaborative leadership, and noting that he joins Penn from his recent position at Techstars, where he served as Chief Brand and Communications Officer since 2021.

Academic Report - John L. Jackson, Jr.

Provost John L. Jackson, Jr. shared news of the reappointments of two colleagues in the Provost's Office, including Beth A. Winkelstein, the Eduardo D. Glandt President's Distinguished Professor in the School of Engineering and Applied Science, as Deputy Provost, citing her ten years of invaluable academic leadership. Provost Jackson also shared that Laura Perna, the GSE Centennial Presidential Professor of Education, has been reappointed as Vice Provost for Faculty, calling her a leader and great partner in sustaining one of Penn's most important commitments: supporting world-class faculty members at every stage of their careers.

The following Resolution was approved (full Resolution text is appended):

Financial Report – Craig R. Carnaroli

Senior Executive Vice President Craig R. Carnaroli began by reporting on the Consolidated University, stating that total net assets were \$32 billion as of December 31, 2024, an increase of \$1.7 billion, or 5.7%, over the prior year. He noted the change in net assets from operations reflected an increase of \$623 million, \$237 million, or 61.5%, above the prior year, and total revenue of \$8.6 billion was \$910 million, or 11.8%, above the prior year. He added that expenses of \$8 billion were \$673 million, or 9.2%, above the prior year.

Turning to the Academic Component, SEVP Carnaroli stated the change in net assets from operations reflected a \$440 million increase versus a \$221 million increase in the prior year, and total revenue of \$2.8 billion was \$337 million, or 13.9%, above the prior year. He noted expenses of \$2.3 billion were \$118 million, or 5.3%, above the prior year.

He stated that capital expenditures totaled \$239 million, \$34 million, or 12.4%, below the prior year, adding that notable projects include the Quadrangle and College Hall renovations, and construction of Vagelos Laboratory for Energy Science & Technology, Amy Gutmann Hall, and the Ott Center for Track and Field.

Reporting on the Health System, SEVP Carnaroli stated that the change in net assets from operations reflected an increase of \$117 million, and operating revenue increased \$553 million, or 10.5%, from \$5.3 billion to \$5.8 billion. He noted expenses increased \$553 million, or 10.8%, from \$5.1 billion to \$5.7 billion.

Lastly, SEVP Carnaroli reported adjusted admissions of 167,784 through three months were 1.7% above the prior year, and capital expenditures totaled \$283 million, \$48 million, or 20.6%, above the prior year.

Penn Medicine Report - Jonathan A. Epstein

Jonathan A. Epstein expressed that he is honored to serve as the new Dean of the Perelman School of Medicine and Executive Vice President of the University of Pennsylvania for the Health System. He noted that leading Penn Medicine at such a critical time in the evolution of medicine and health care is a profound privilege, and Penn is a place where scientific discovery, patient care, and education are seamlessly integrated, creating an environment of unparalleled excellence. He expressed excitement about working with Health System CEO Kevin Mahoney and the extraordinary faculty, students, trainees, and staff to advance Penn Medicine's mission and to shape the future of health and medicine.

Dr. Epstein stated that academic medical systems across the country are facing unusual challenges, and Penn Medicine is no exception, noting that science and higher education have come under intense scrutiny – in politics and in the public eye. He acknowledged a rapidly changing world, where new regulations may directly impact how discovery science is pursued and to what degree clinical trials of potentially life-saving therapies can be supported. He noted that Penn is resilient and actively engaged in adapting and innovating in ways that will be necessary to preserve the University's primary missions of research, education, patient care and community service.

Dr. Epstein thanked those who are helping to advocate for the importance of Penn Medicine's work, its economic value in the region, and its impact on so many patients' lives.

Dr. Epstein announced that Suzi Rose, MD, MSEd, will transition from her role as Senior Vice Dean for Medical Education at the end of this academic year. He thanked Dr. Rose for her dedicated service to undergraduate medical education, and noted that Dr. Lisa Bellini, Executive Vice Dean, will lead a consultative process to identify Dr. Rose's successor.

Dr. Epstein closed by stating that the Pavilion at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, a beacon of hope for so many, has been renamed The Clifton Center for Medical Breakthroughs, thanks to Catherine Clifton, a member of the Penn Medicine Board, and her husband, Anthony. He shared that the couple made a generous philanthropic commitment, which was recently celebrated with a flash gathering in the lobby of the building attended by hundreds of thrilled members of the Penn Medicine community. Dr. Epstein expressed his gratitude to the Cliftons.

Committee Reports

Academic Policy - David Ertel

Chair David Ertel stated that the Academic Policy Committee learned more about the recommendations of the University Task Force on Antisemitism and the Presidential Commission on Countering Hate and Building Community. He noted the two University commissions were established in the fall of 2023 in response to campus events and issued their recommendations at the end of the last academic year.

Chair Ertel noted the University Task Force on Antisemitism was charged with gaining a better understanding of how members of the Penn community experience antisemitism on campus and identify the best practices to counter it, and the Presidential Commission on Countering Hate and Building Community was charged with examining how members of the Penn community experience hatred and discrimination on campus and recommend strategies to build and strengthen the Penn community.

He stated that Deputy Provost Beth A. Winkelstein has been leading the implementation efforts based on the Task Force and Commission recommendations, and she explained to the Committee the common themes across the two sets of recommendations, including enhancing initiatives to better promote cross-cultural understanding, open expression, incident reporting, and Jewish studies and student life.

Chair Ertel stated the Committee learned the recommendations call for better defining and asserting Penn's values, which led to the creation and publication of a formal University Values Statement at the start of this academic year. He noted other initiatives include a new Office of Religious and Ethnic Inclusion, a new task force to review the guidelines on open expression, and a new community-building event during New Student Orientation. He noted the Committee also heard from four members of the Penn community who have been involved in campus initiatives related to the work of the two Commissions.

Chair Ertel reported the Committee approved two Resolutions, including one that details an expedited process for the Penn Museum to return human remains when they are requested, should the Museum deem the request necessary and appropriate. He stated the second Resolution establishes a Master of Applied Economics and Data Science in the School of Arts and Sciences, which will help drive the importance of data science across campus, a key part of *In Principle and Practice*.

Audit & Compliance – Alan D. Schnitzer

Chair Alan D. Schnitzer reported that the Audit and Compliance Committee approved the minutes of its November 14, 2024, meeting. He stated that Trustee Ertel provided a report on the meeting of the Penn Medicine Audit and Compliance Committee held on February 11, 2025.

Chair Schnitzer stated the Committee received several briefings, including from Vice President Greg Pellicano who provided an update of the activities of the Office of Audit, Compliance and Privacy; Comptroller Russell Di Leo who gave an update on the consolidated financials for the University and the Health System for the first six months of the fiscal year; Pricewaterhouse-Coopers (PwC) representatives Tim Weld and William Liva who presented the results of the First and Second Quarter Report, as well as their Fiscal Year 2025 Audit Engagement Plan; Vice President for Finance and Treasurer Mark Dingfield who discussed the status of the Uniformed Guidance Audit performed by PwC; Vice President for the Division of Public Safety Kathleen Shields Anderson who provided a Clery Report update; and Senior Executive Vice President Craig Carnaroli who provided an Institutional Risk Management update.

Chair Schnitzer reported that the Committee reviewed and approved two Resolutions, the first to approve the engagement of the independent accountants (PwC) for Fiscal Year 2025, and the second to pre-approve non-audit fees paid to the independent accountants for Fiscal Year 2026.

Budget & Finance – James G. Dinan

Chair James Dinan stated that VP Dingfield, Vice President for Budget Planning and Analysis Trevor Lewis, and Senior Vice President and Chief Financial Officer for the University of Pennsylvania Health System Julia Puchtler gave a presentation on the University and Health System's financial results as of December 31, 2024. He added that SEVP Carnaroli had already shared key financial numbers.

Chair Dinan reported that VP Lewis presented the University's recommendation for changes to undergraduate tuition and fees for the Academic Year 2025-2026, and the Committee is presenting a Resolution to approve a 3.75% increase for undergraduate tuition and 3.7% increase for total charges. He noted total charges (tuition, fees, and room and board) will be \$91,112 for Academic Year 2025-2026.

Chair Dinan stated that VP Dingfield provided an update on the University's continued commitment to access and affordability, highlighting the recent enhancements the University has made to the undergraduate student aid program. He noted that VP Dingfield also detailed the Quaker Commitment, a new initiative specifically designed to enhance the financial aid packages of middle-income students.

Chair Dinan reported the Committee reviewed and approved three Resolutions.

Development – Wendy Commins Holman

Chair Wendy Holman reported that the Development Committee received a brief update on fundraising activities and donor engagement, including the many regional events planned for the remainder of the year. She noted that Dr. Jameson provided an update on his involvement in recent Development and Alumni Relations activities, including the dedication of the Jane and David Ott Center for Track and Field, the opening of the Vagelos Laboratory for Energy Science and Technology, and his recent trips to Asia and Miami.

Chair Holman reported that Dr. Jameson highlighted a few extraordinary gifts, including support from several Trustees, new commitments to student life and scholarships, and the recently announced naming gift from Catherine and Anthony Clifton for The Clifton Center for Medical Breakthroughs, formerly known as the Pavilion at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania.

Chair Holman noted the Committee heard from John Wherry, the Richard and Barbara Schiffrin President's Distinguished Professor and Chair of the Department of Systems Pharmacology & Translational Therapeutics, about his work with the Colton Center for Autoimmunity at Penn. She reported that Dr. Wherry explained new advances in this important field, including that scientists now know that everyone has an immune fingerprint, which can be used to create personalized immunotherapies—therapies that mobilize the body's own immune response to treat not just the symptoms but the underlying causes of disease. She noted Dr. Wherry emphasized that Penn has the vision, the tools, and the technologies to unravel the mysteries of autoimmune disease.

Chair Holman stated that Dr. Wherry expanded on the Coltons' philanthropy which led to the creation of the Colton Center, laying the foundation for a transformation in autoimmune disease research and care. He noted that their investment focused much needed resources, tools, and attention on autoimmunity and reinforced Penn's leadership in the field of Immune Health, and the Colton Center has already rallied Penn's large immunology community, launched numerous pilot studies, and initiated Programs of Excellence, new collaborations within Penn, and the Colton Consortium.

Chair Holman reported that Dr. Wherry concluded by emphasizing this is a moment of opportunity, and Penn is seeking partners to drive broader progress in the field of autoimmunity, including launching a moonshot initiative to generate comprehensive immune data gathered from patients at key inflection points of disease and treatment. He noted that no dataset of this scope and quality currently exists, and the lack of such a data source is a significant hindrance to the field, but by addressing this gap head-on, this moonshot project will enable fundamental and catalytic advances at the Colton Consortium and beyond—and will decisively position the Consortium as a global leader in autoimmunity.

Chair Holman noted the Committee engaged in an animated discussion and expressed sincere support for and interest in this important area of medicine.

Facilities and Campus Planning – David S. Blitzer

Chair David Blitzer reported that the Facilities and Campus Planning Committee heard a presentation on School and Center Master Space Planning, which was introduced by Anne Papageorge, Senior Vice President of Facilities and Real Estate Services.

Chair Blitzer stated that Mark Kocent, University Architect, elaborated on the process, which starts with selecting a design firm to evaluate the existing physical footprint, space utilization, building conditions, required investments, and projected program growth. He noted the strategic vision and master space plan are aligned with Budget Office and Development goals, and the final master plan balances the need for reinvestment and potential future growth.

Chair Blitzer stated that SVP Papageorge introduced a Real Estate Market Update presentation, noting that real estate developments are in flux nationally for many reasons, including high interest rates and increased construction and land costs. She noted that while Penn is not immune, University City perseveres, with Penn, its neighboring institutions, and private developers contributing significantly.

Chair Blitzer reported that Ed Datz, Executive Director of Real Estate, provided the details on Penn's portfolio, including that office occupancy, which primarily supports the Penn swing space needs, remains strong, projected at 93% in FY25. Executive Director Datz stated the residential portfolio has stabilized since COVID, with anticipated occupancy at 94% in both FY25 and FY26. He noted retail continues to experience some stressors, and although demand is still strong, it is harder to close deals. He noted recent retail openings include McDonald's, Gouldsburger's, and Raxx Vintage, with anticipated openings of Philly Rock Gym and Big

Dean's Hot Chicken. Executive Director Datz reported the life sciences market has slowed, both nationally and in Philadelphia, and the Pennovation infrastructure project that will allow development of future parcels continues, keeping Penn well-positioned for when the pause ceases, adding that despite reduced occupancy, Pennovation manages expenses to budget. He stated policy, economic, and funding shifts due to administration changes will be critical factors in shaping FY26 outcomes.

Chair Blitzer stated that Michael Scales, Vice President Business Services, introduced a presentation on the renovation of the Inn at Penn, which has been a key part of the campus since 1999. VP Scales stated the renovation ensures Penn's commitment to premier hospitality standards and includes aesthetic, infrastructure, and ADA upgrades. Chair Blitzer reported that Caren Foster, Principal, Moody Nolan, explained that all 248 guest rooms, bathrooms, corridors, lobbies, and meeting rooms will receive new furnishings and fixtures with a modernized and refined look, adding that the \$43.4 million project has recently completed design development and is scheduled for a phased construction from November 2025 through June 2026. She noted that hotel operations will continue through construction and Trustee meetings will not be interrupted.

Chair Blitzer reported that Joy De Jesus, Executive Associate Athletic Director, Finance and Administration, and Chief Financial Officer, introduced the Men's and Women's Lacrosse Locker Rooms Project, made possible by philanthropic support led by Trustee James Greene. She stated the renovation will elevate the locker rooms to match the caliber of the lacrosse programs. William McCullough, Principal, EwingCole, reported that the scope of work includes new lockers, restrooms and showers, ADA upgrades, new finishes, enlarged coaches' rooms, grab and go areas, improved storage, as well as upgrades to lighting, technology, HVAC, and fire protection. He noted that construction of the \$6.9 million project will begin in June 2025 and continue through occupancy in January 2026.

Local, National, and Global Engagement – Jill Topkis Weiss

Chair Jill Topkis Weiss reported that the Local, National, and Global Engagement Committee heard from a panel on climate and sustainability research, programs, and engagement, and from Penn Global representatives on program offerings abroad.

Chair Topkis Weiss noted the panel included moderator Michael Mann, Presidential Distinguished Professor and Vice Provost for Climate Science, Policy, and Action; Sanya Carley, Presidential Distinguished Professor of Energy Policy and City Planning and the Mark Alan Hughes Faculty Director of the Kleinman Center for Energy Policy; Kathleen Morrison, the Sally and Alvin V. Shoemaker Professor of Anthropology and Faculty Director of the Environmental Innovations Initiative; and Howard Neukrug, Executive Director of the Water Center at Penn. Their discussion focused on the importance of working across disciplines to urgently address the climate crisis and prepare the next generation of climate leaders.

Chair Topkis Weiss reported the Committee also heard from Ezekiel Emanuel, Vice Provost for Global Initiatives, who addressed the expansion of Penn Global offerings abroad beyond

traditional semester-long programs, emphasizing the high demand for these programs and the importance of accessible global experiences for Penn students of all backgrounds. Chair Topkis Weiss noted Dr. Emanuel was joined by Amy Gadsden, Associate Vice Provost for Global Initiatives, and Kristyn Palmiotto, Executive Director of Penn Abroad.

Student Life - Catherine M. O'Hern Lyons

Chair Catherine Lyons reported the Student Life Committee meeting was focused on key Penn programs that provide students with opportunities for personal growth, strengthen the community, and build connections and understanding. She stated that Sigal Ben-Porath, Faculty Director of the Paideia Program, discussed the program's core values and structure, highlighting initiatives such as the Fellows Program and the Political Empathy Lab. She noted that Malik Muhammad, Director of the Office of Interpersonal Development and Engagement, shared an overview of his department's guiding principles and programming, focusing on informal engagement opportunities, including community dinners and workshops on various topics such as authenticity and identity. Chair Lyons reported that Steve Kocher, Senior Associate Chaplain and Director of the Spiritual and Religious Life Center, and Ranim Albarkawi, Program Coordinator for Middle Eastern and Arab Student Communities, provided insight into University-wide interfaith and crisis response dialogue initiatives, programs that, among many others across the University, foster meaningful engagement and critical dialogue among students, helping to promote understanding and connection.

Chair Lyons reported the meeting concluded with a panel discussion moderated by Vice Provost for University Life Karu Kozuma, during which students shared personal reflections of their experiences in these programs, including how they navigated challenging conversations, and key lessons they learned. Chair Lyons noted the students emphasized the value of empathy, active listening, perspective-sharing, and trust-building in strengthening their sense of community at Penn and beyond. She added that Trustees and Committee members engaged presenters and students with thoughtful questions, expressed appreciation for the programs, showed enthusiasm for their impact, and inquired about potential opportunities for expansion.

Penn Alumni Report – Michael L. Barrett

Penn Alumni President Michael L. Barrett began by welcoming new Alumni Trustee, Alp Ercil, ENG'95, W'95, who is serving a five-year term that began on January 1, 2025.

President Barrett stated the Penn Alumni Volunteer Leadership Retreat will kick off this afternoon with the Board of Directors and Committee members. He noted this evening's reception at Penn Dental will be hosted by Penn Alumni volunteer Steve Roth, W'66, with a food demonstration and dinner provided by The Quaker Kitchen Chefs at Amy Gutmann College House. He noted that tomorrow's meeting in Huntsman Hall will feature a presentation by Tim Rommen, Vice Provost of the Arts and the Davidson Kennedy Professor in the School of Arts and Sciences.

President Barrett noted plans for the retreat also include Board and Committee meetings, and a presentation by Kelly O'Conner, Director of Marketing and Communications in Alumni

Relations, who will give a "myPenn" tutorial to increase alumni engagement and networking. He noted the retreat will conclude Saturday evening with a celebration of the 20th anniversary of Penn Traditions, the first student philanthropy and engagement program in the country, founded by Elise Betz.

President Barrett urged Trustees to join two upcoming events, including Frontiers of Knowledge and Discovery: San Francisco, on March 11 to learn about how Penn's growing strengths in climate and energy are addressing environmental realities, and a segment of the Penn2You series in Atlanta on March 25, where Penn experts will discuss AI, plant biology, and the impact emotions has on science.

Lastly, he reminded Trustees that Alumni Weekend will take place on May 17-19 and thanked everyone for supporting Penn Alumni.

Resolution of Appreciation for Richard C. Perry and Designation as Trustee Emeritus

"An investment in knowledge pays the best interest."

Richard Perry took these famous words from Benjamin Franklin to heart. Even as he gained acclaim on Wall Street as a legendary investor and hedge-fund manager, Richard invested in his alma mater. And to Penn's lasting benefit, Richard consistently sought to advance the University's highest priorities. "What does Penn need?" he would ask, always enthusiastically supporting the University's core mission of advancing knowledge for the greater good.

After graduating from Wharton with a BS in marketing, Richard began his distinguished career in the investment world at Goldman Sachs, where he worked in equity arbitrage. During this time, he also earned his MBA from New York University's Stern School of Business. In 1988, he left Goldman to found Perry Capital, where he served as CEO and gained renown as one of the hedge-fund industry's most successful investors.

During these busy years of building his business, Richard remained connected to Penn. Deeply committed to the Class of 1977, Richard chaired both the Reunion and Gift Committees. He also served on the Wharton School's Undergraduate Executive Board and as Chair of The Penn Fund Class Agents.

In 2005, Richard was invited to join the University's Board of Trustees, where he has served ever since, lending his expertise to the Budget and Finance, Honorary Degrees and Awards, Academic Policy, Development, and Neighborhood Initiatives committees. In every setting, Richard shared insights and recommendations, ensuring Penn's best interests remained paramount and decisions were made for the betterment of the University. Offering sound and thoughtful leadership, Richard has been a Trustee in the truest sense of the word.

After the inauguration of Amy Gutmann as Penn's eighth president, Richard led the way in helping realize an ambitious vision for the University outlined in the Penn Compact. Time and again, he supported its highest priorities to integrate knowledge, engage locally and globally, and increase access.

With a focus on working across academic boundaries to solve complex, real-world problems, the Penn Integrates Knowledge (PIK) Program was established.

Seeing the extraordinary potential of the PIK program to catapult cross-disciplinary scholarship and promote academic inquiry, Richard become the first to support the distinctive new initiative. While making an exceptional investment in Penn's faculty, he also set an example for other leadership donors, who soon followed him. Today, there are 30 PIK professorships to further strengthen a stellar faculty. Notably, the first Perry PIK appointment in 2006 is now Penn's Provost.

Several years later, Richard and his wife, Lisa, were inspired by another Penn priority to establish the Perry World House, a research center that advances interdisciplinary, policy-focused

research on the world's most urgent global affairs challenges. To provide leadership to the new center, they also established the Richard Perry Professorship. Since its 2016 opening, Perry World House has hosted dozens of global leaders, bringing Penn to the world and the world to Penn, while offering unparalleled learning opportunities for students.

Richard's commitment to the third pillar of the Penn Compact, increasing access, was another area where he demonstrated his desire to inspire. He and other Penn alumni at his firm established the Perry Capital Alumni Endowed Scholarships to provide financial aid to undergraduate students. Perry Capital also funded the Perry Capital Challenge Grant Program, which helps support student financial aid at Wharton.

Throughout Richard's involvement with Penn, he has led by example. He has maintained a connection with the academic life of the University and shared his experiences with administrators, faculty, and students with insightful and constructive perspectives.

RESOLVED, that the Trustees of the University of Pennsylvania, on behalf of themselves, the administration, faculty, students, and alumni of the University, convey their deepest appreciation to Richard Perry for his dedication to the University's highest priorities, his extraordinary commitment to realizing the vision of the Penn Compact, and his transformational philanthropy, which has strengthened the University, its faculty, and its global reach. His enlightened investment in Penn has already paid extraordinary dividends and will continue to do so for years to come.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that Richard C. Perry be designated a Trustee Emeritus, effective February 28, 2025.

Resolution Authorizing the Approval of the Voluntary Dissolution and Strike-off of Penn Medicine London

Intention:

Penn Medicine London Limited ("PML") is a limited liability company limited by shares that was established in the United Kingdom ("UK") in 2018 under the control of UPenn International ("UPI") as the sole member to develop a greater presence by the Trustees of the University of Pennsylvania ("The Trustees") on behalf of Penn Medicine in the UK. Since then, Penn Medicine has developed other avenues to establish that presence that are more cost effective and no longer has any formal business that requires a limited liability company in the UK. Management has also been working to dissolve subsidiary corporate entities that do not have any current operational or financial activity but for which regulatory filings continue to be made to comply with applicable laws and resulting costs are incurred. Management accordingly recommends that PML be dissolved.

Section 7.3(f) of the Articles of Association of PML requires the authorization and approval of The Trustees for the closure, dissolution, sale or termination of PML. A voluntary dissolution also requires a "strike-off" of the company from the UK corporate register in accordance with Section 1003 of the UK's Companies Act of 2006. PML is registered in the UK at Suite 2 First Floor, 10 Temple Back, Bristol, UK, BS1 6FL, with Company Number 11610103. The Boards of Trustees of UPI and PML have proposed and recommended and are in the process of approving the voluntary dissolution and strike-off of PML under UK law. The Penn Medicine Executive Committee has also recommended to The Trustees that they further authorize and approve the voluntary dissolution and strike-off of PML pursuant to its above-described authority.

RESOLVED, that The Trustees direct that PML be dissolved voluntarily and voluntarily stricken-off the corporate registries, which dissolution and strike-off shall proceed under the UK's Companies Act of 2006.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that all officers of PML, UPI, and The Trustees (each an "Authorized Officer") are hereby authorized and directed to: (a) prepare, execute, and deliver, for and on behalf of PML, (i) dissolution and voluntary strike-off documents for filing with the appropriate UK authorities, and (ii) any and all other documents, instruments, agreements, certifications, writings, forms, reports, returns, or affidavits that are required by any state, federal or UK government or that such Authorized Officer shall deem necessary or appropriate in connection with the voluntary dissolution and strike-off of PML; and (b) take any such other actions that such Authorized Officer deems necessary or appropriate in connection with the voluntary dissolution and strike-off of PML, including, without limitation, the payment of any claims and the distribution of any assets.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that any action heretofore taken by any Authorized Officer, trustee, director, employee, agent, or other representative of PML, UPI, or The Trustees in connection with the voluntary dissolution and strike-off of PML is hereby adopted, ratified, and confirmed.

Resolution to Appoint Jonathan A. Epstein as Executive Vice President of the University of Pennsylvania for the Health System and Dean of the Perelman School of Medicine

Jonathan A. Epstein, MD, the William Wikoff Smith Professor in the Department of Medicine of the Perelman School of Medicine, has served as Interim Executive Vice President for the Health System and Interim Dean of the Perelman School of Medicine since December 2023. A world-renowned expert in cardiovascular biology, Dr. Epstein has been a key leader at Penn for nearly three decades, serving as Executive Vice Dean and Chief Scientific Officer of the Perelman School of Medicine, Senior Vice President and Chief Scientific Officer of the Health System, Chair of the Department of Cell and Developmental Biology, Scientific Director of the Penn Cardiovascular Institute, and Founding Director of the Institute of Regenerative Medicine.

Dr. Epstein is globally recognized for his contributions to the understanding of the biology and genetics of the cardiovascular system. He has made many paradigm-shifting discoveries based on a deep understanding of the molecular mechanisms of human biology and disease, with profound implications for treating pediatric and adult cardiovascular disease. His studies of angiogenesis, epigenetics, stem cells, and blood vessel patterning have had direct implications for the development of new therapies to treat heart failure, and his innovations in such areas as cardiac regeneration, stem cell biology, and CAR T-cell therapy have been featured on the cover of Science and in such major publications as *Nature*, *Scientific American*, and *The New York Times*.

Dr. Epstein is an elected member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the Association of American Physicians, and the National Academy of Medicine, as well as a fellow of the American Heart Association and the past president of the American Society for Clinical Investigation. His many honors include the Sir William Osler Young Investigator Award, the Outstanding Investigator Award from the American Federation for Medical Research, and the American College of Physicians Harriet P. Dustan Award for Outstanding Work in Science as Related to Medicine. A graduate of Harvard College and Harvard Medical School, he joined Penn in 1996 after completing his residency and fellowship in Medicine and Cardiology at the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

RESOLVED, that Jonathan A. Epstein, MD, be appointed as Executive Vice President for the Health System and Dean of the Perelman School of Medicine, effective March 1, 2025.

Resolution to Appoint Matthew Grossman as Vice President for University Communications

Matthew Grossman brings a wealth of communications experience, global perspective, and an admirable record of creative, strategic, and collaborative leadership. As Vice President for University Communications, Grossman will be responsible for the development and implementation of a long-term communications plan for Penn. Serving as a key advisor to the President and other senior officers of the University, he will oversee the University's internal and external communications operations, partner with Schools and Centers on institutional communications, and promote the widespread recognition of Penn's contributions to the community, nation, and world.

Mr. Grossman comes to Penn from Techstars, a global leader in early-stage technology investment, where he has served as Chief Brand and Communications Officer since 2021. Previously, he spent 12 years at the Walt Disney Company, leading communications across Europe, the Middle East, and Africa. Earlier in his career, he was the Senior Vice President, International Corporate, for Edelman Communications. He also held roles at the Motion Picture Association of America, where he directed corporate communications and digital strategy.

Mr. Grossman earned his MBA from the Anderson School of Business at UCLA and his undergraduate degree from Middlebury College.

RESOLVED, that Matthew Grossman be appointed Vice President for University Communications, effective April 7, 2025.

Resolution on Ethical Returns or Shared Stewardship of Human Remains from the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology

Intention:

The Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA), Public Law 101-601, requires museums holding Native American human remains and associated funerary objects to, upon request, expeditiously return such human remains and associated funerary objects to lineal descendants, federally recognized Indian Tribes, or Native Hawaiian Organizations. The Penn Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology also holds other human remains from around the world, representing over 10,000 years of history, that are not covered by the provisions of NAGPRA. In 2023, the Museum completed a comprehensive institution-wide reassessment of its policies related to all human remains and adopted a new Human Remains Policy that provides a rigorous basis for ethical stewardship of all human remains in the Museum's collections. The care and stewardship of these collections are at the core of the Museum's strategic plan and vision.

International entities have requested the repatriation of some of these human remains, and the Museum wishes to return them or consider shared stewardship arrangements in appropriate circumstances. In recent years, other museums and private collectors have similarly returned human remains that are outside the scope of NAGPRA. The Museum is currently compiling an updated inventory of the human remains in its collection and coordinating requests for returns. This resolution would enable the Director of the Museum or their designees, in consultation with the Provost, to take such actions as are required to return human remains that fall outside the scope of NAGPRA. The Board of Advisors of the Museum has approved such returns.

RESOLVED, that the Director of the Museum or their designees, in consultation with the Provost, be authorized to take such actions as are required to deaccession and return human remains and to enter into shared stewardship arrangements in appropriate circumstances.

Resolution to Establish a Master of Applied Economics and Data Science in the School of Arts and Sciences

Intention:

The School of Arts and Sciences proposes to establish a Master of Applied Economics and Data Science, which would train business leaders, analysts, and policymakers in the increasingly important use of data across all professional fields. It would draw on Penn's deep expertise in economics, informing the techniques of data science with the models of economics to provide a unique framework that is not offered by similar programs at peer universities.

The new degree would exist at the hub of initiatives across the University to advance Penn's leadership in data science, defined by both the Data Driven Discovery Initiative launched four years ago as part of the School of Arts and Sciences strategic plan and the University's new strategic framework, *In Principle and Practice*, which identifies data as one of the four "great challenges of our time" on which Penn is called to lead. These goals are being widely implemented across the university, including the new Amy Gutmann Hall, purpose-built to catalyze cross-disciplinary data and research initiatives; new Data Science minors in both the School of Arts and Sciences and the School of Engineering and Applied Science; and the new Penn Advanced Research Computing Center, which will significantly advance support and infrastructure for data-driven research at Penn.

The degree would be a full-time on-campus program, designed to be completed in twelve courses across three semesters, including a capstone team research project and an optional internship or research experience over the summer. It would aim to provide analytical skills that facilitate decision-making and new ways to think about how data – and new technologies in general – can be used most beneficially in the years ahead. It would include overviews of such key areas as macroeconomics, microeconomics, econometrics, machine learning, and computational methods, with a focus on three areas: using economic models to improve decision-making, particularly in interpreting and drawing inferences from data; extracting information from data, particularly through major economic data sets, econometrics, and machine learning; and developing technical proficiency in quantitative data analysis, including the R and Python programming languages. It would aim to reach a steady state of fifty students by admitting a first class of thirty students in 2026, a second class of forty students in 2027, and then classes of fifty students in following years.

The new degree has been approved by the Provost, the Academic Planning and Budget Committee, and the faculty of the School of Arts and Sciences.

RESOLVED, that there shall be established in the School of Arts and Sciences a Master of Applied Economics and Data Science as defined in this resolution.

Resolution on the Engagement of the Independent Accountant for Fiscal Year 2025

Intention:

Independent accountants are engaged annually to express an opinion as to whether the financial statements, as prepared by management, considered in their entirety, present fairly, in all material aspects, the University's financial position, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The Trustees of the University of Pennsylvania, through its Committee on Audit and Compliance, are responsible for engaging the independent accountants.

RESOLVED, that PricewaterhouseCoopers be and hereby is appointed as independent accountants to audit the financial statements of the University of Pennsylvania for the period ended June 30, 2025.

Resolution to Approve Recurring Non-Audit Fees for FY26

Intention:

In accordance with the Trustee Committee on Audit and Compliance (Committee) charter, the Committee is required to approve any non-audit fees paid to the Independent Accountant. The Committee recognizes that the University and Health System historically engage the Independent Accountant to perform various recurring Tax compliance and Tax consulting services and several other recurring non-audit services, and these services typically commence with the start of each fiscal year. It is the intention of the Committee to provide Management with the flexibility to engage the Independent Accountant for such recurring non-audit services up to certain preapproved limits. These pre-approved limits are being set based off the estimated fees for Fiscal Year 2025, as noted in the Independent Accountant's Engagement Plan, and are not to exceed 110% of the estimated fees as presented to the Audit and Compliance Committee, for areas noted below. The Committee delegates the authority to the Chair to approve non-audit fees paid to the Independent Accountant in excess of the pre-approved limits.

Tax Services – University
Tax services – Health System
Other Services – University
Other Services – Health System

The Independent Accountant will provide the Fiscal Year 2025 estimated fees for non-audit services when it presents its Fiscal Year 2025 Engagement Plan for approval.

RESOLVED, that Management of the University and Health System is hereby authorized to engage the Independent Accountants for Fiscal Year 2026 for recurring non-audit services up to the pre-approved limits.

Resolution to Authorize Tuition, Fees, & Other Student Charges and Financial Aid for Academic Year 2025-2026

Intention:

The administration proposes to establish the following tuition, fees, and other student charges for Academic Year 2025-2026:

For undergraduates, tuition, fees, room, and board will total \$91,112. This includes tuition of \$63,204, fees of \$8,032, a standard room rate in the residence halls of \$13,132, and a meal plan charge of \$6,744. For graduate and professional students, tuition will be determined administratively to reflect the budget requirements of the various schools.

The administration projects that the undergraduate financial aid budget for Academic Year 2025-2026 will total \$328 Million.

RESOLVED, that for Academic Year 2025-2026, total undergraduate charges will be \$91,112 including tuition of \$63,204, fees of \$8,032, a standard room rate in the residence halls of \$13,132, and a meal plan charge of \$6,744, and that the undergraduate financial aid budget will be established at \$328 Million.

Resolution Authorizing up to \$16,000,000 for the Planning, Design, Development and Construction of the Expansion of the Penn Medicine 76th Street Pharmacy in University of Pennsylvania Health System Fiscal Year 2025 Capital Contingency Funds

Intention:

One of the University of Pennsylvania Health System ("UPHS") hospitals, the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania ("HUP") operates a central fill pharmacy, the Penn Medicine 76th Street Pharmacy, located at 3250 South 76th Street, Philadelphia (the "76th Street Pharmacy") fully supporting HUP's specialty pharmacy program. The 76th Street Pharmacy currently also partially supports the specialty pharmacy programs for Pennsylvania Hospital ("PAH") and Penn Presbyterian Medical Center ("PPMC"). Specialty pharmacy volume has been growing at a rapid rate and the program is projected to run out of space by January 2026. The specialty pharmacy program, through care integration with UPHS hospitals' outpatient clinics, is a paradigm shift in the primary way that patient care is delivered and provides UPHS with a competitive advantage to the external marketplace. UPHS Management has recommended expanding the licensed pharmacy footprint from approximately 5500 square feet to 13,200 square feet and upgrading the infrastructure in order to maintain program growth and centralize specialty pharmacy services for HUP, PAH, PPMC, and subsequently Lancaster General Hospital, in alignment with UPHS' One Penn Medicine strategy.

Management recommends that up to \$16,000,000 be authorized for capital costs for the expansion of the 76th Street Pharmacy including planning, design and construction, infrastructure upgrades, information technology and telecommunication infrastructure, pharmacy equipment, furniture, fixtures and equipment, fit out, and other costs associated with the 76th Street Pharmacy (the "Expansion Project"). Management further recommends that the funds for the Expansion Project be authorized through the capital contingency funds that are part of the approved Fiscal Year 2025 capital budget.

The Penn Medicine Finance Committee and Penn Medicine Executive Committee have recommended approval of the Expansion Project to The Trustees Budget and Finance Committee.

RESOLVED, that The Trustees authorize the Expansion Project as described in the foregoing Intention and as presented to the Penn Medicine Executive Committee and The Trustees Budget and Finance Committee.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that The Trustees approve and authorize the capital expenditure not to exceed \$16,000,000 in UPHS Fiscal Year 2025 capital contingency budget funds for the Expansion Project as described in the foregoing Intention.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that authority is hereby delegated to the Executive Vice President for UPHS or his designee, or other appropriate officers of the University, Penn Medicine Executive Committee and UPHS Management to take such action, approve and execute such documents, instruments and agreements and incur such expenses and obligations on behalf of The Trustees as may be necessary to effectuate and implement the Expansion Project as contemplated in the

foregoing resolutions substantially within the parameters described therein – not, however, in excess of 110 percent of the estimated costs as presented to The Trustees Budget and Finance Committee; provided that any material changes such officer deems advisable, necessary or appropriate in order to effectuate the Expansion Project may be made with the express concurrence of the UPHS Chief Executive Officer.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that any and all actions heretofore taken by The Trustees, Penn Medicine and UPHS with regard to any and all instruments, documents or agreements made or delivered prior to the date hereof in connection with the foregoing resolutions are hereby adopted, ratified and confirmed in all respects.

Resolution to Authorize Pennovation Works Parking Garage, Phase 1 in the Amount of \$13,272,000

Intention:

Facilities and Real Estate Services wishes to proceed with the first phase of the construction of a parking garage at Pennovation Works. The Pennovation Works Master Plan calls for the building of two parking garages to support approximately 1.9 million square feet of occupiable space at Pennovation Works. The first of these two garages will be built in conjunction with a future third-party developed building. The first phase of this parking garage consists of a 5,600 square foot three-story bay at the south end of the garage and is needed to house the electrical substation purchased as part of a concurrent project to improve the infrastructure of the Pennovation Works site. Though this early phase of the garage does not include any parking spaces, it does include the concrete caisson foundations and concrete foundation grade beams at this southern bay for the future 10-story parking garage. The project scope also includes a below-grade, concrete vault for maintenance, and relocation of the Pennovation Works Lab Building electrical service. This phase of the project is estimated to cost \$13,272,000 and will be funded by real estate operating reserves and an internal capital loan.

RESOLVED, that the Pennovation Works Parking Garage, Phase 1, estimated to cost \$13,272,000, be and the same hereby is approved and that the Senior Executive Vice President or the Senior Vice President for Facilities and Real Estate Services or Vice President for Finance and Treasurer be and hereby are authorized to take such actions, execute such contracts and incur such expenses and obligations – not, however, in excess of 110% of the estimated costs as presented to the Budget and Finance Committee – as may, in his or her judgment, be necessary or desirable to accomplish the purposes of this resolution. Any actions heretofore taken by any such officers in furtherance of the purpose of this resolution are hereby ratified and confirmed.

Resolution to Appoint Denis R. Dancanet to the Board of Advisors of the School of Engineering and Applied Science

RESOLVED, that Denis R. Dancanet be appointed to the Board of Advisors of the School of Engineering and Applied Science for a renewable three-year term, effective February 28, 2025.

Dr. Dancanet, C'90, ENG'90, is President of Cubist Systematic Strategies, LLC. He serves as a member of Penn Engineering's Technical Advisory Board. Dr. Dancanet holds an MS and PhD in Computer Science from Carnegie Mellon University.

UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA

For the six months ended December 31, 2024

Consolidated University

- Total net assets were \$32.0 billion as of December 31, 2024, an increase of \$1.7 billion, or 5.7% over December 31, 2023.
- The change in net assets from operations reflected an increase of \$623 million through December 31, 2024; \$237 million, or 61.5%, above prior year. Total revenue of \$8.6 billion was \$910 million, or 11.8%, above prior year. Expenses of \$8.0 billion were \$673 million, or 9.2%, above prior year.
- Cash and invested cash totaled approximately \$10.6 billion, an increase of \$103 million, or 1.0%, over prior year. The change in cash over prior year is primarily due to returns on cash balances.

Academic Component

- The change in net assets from operations for the University (Academic Component) reflected a \$440 million increase versus a \$221 million increase in prior year. Total revenue of \$2.8 billion was \$337 million, or 13.9%, above prior year. Expenses of \$2.3 billion were \$118 million, or 5.3%, above prior year.
- Capital expenditures totaled \$239 million as of December 31, 2024, \$34 million, or 12.4%, below prior year. Notable projects include the Quad and College Hall renovations, and construction of Vagelos Laboratory for Energy Science & Technology, Amy Gutmann Hall and the Ott Center for Track and Field.

Health System

- The change in net assets from operations reflected an increase of \$117 million through December 31, 2024. Operating revenue increased \$553 million, or 10.5%, from \$5.3 billion as of December 31, 2023 to \$5.8 billion as of December 31, 2024. Expenses increased \$553 million, or 10.8%, from \$5.1 billion as of December 31, 2023 to \$5.7 billion as of December 31, 2024.
- Adjusted admissions of 167,784 through three months were 1.7% above prior year.
- Capital expenditures totaled \$283 million as of December 31, 2024, \$48 million, or 20.6%, above prior year.
